#### ~ PAST EVENTS ~

#### **August Meeting**

Sue Fraser-Adams, a builder/developer, spoke about her use of native plants in developments: the pitfalls and the triumphs. Once Sue mainly used introduced plants, but she went through a seachange in attitude three



years ago. Not only did she find our native plants beautiful, but they use much less water and required, once they were established, less care, a handy selling point for professional people.

Sue had to battle other builders who caringly "cleaned" up her land by bulldozing "Sue's bush", the Planning Authority which insisted on "big" plants (many natives need to be planted small), and buyers who sometimes pulled up the plants once they'd moved in.

Sue showed pictures of her latest unit developments where she'd left native plants in situ. The moonscapes left by

surrounding builders in the background (see left). Sue's plan for Little Mindil was to build an eco-resort highlighting such plants and attracting birds, butterflies and other native fauna.

#### **Book Auction**

Sally Jacka held a book auction during the August general meeting. It wasn't quite the serious affair one generally sees at such events, but a lot of fun with much boisterous competition for the more desirable publications.

#### **August Field Trip**

On Sunday 26 August a small group of TENPS members and friends met with Sue Fraser-Adams and Penni Tastula of Northern Gateway at Little Mindil next to the casino. Whilst sipping on champagne, Sue gave us some insight into the development proposal she had for the site. We were able to see the plans displayed on billboards as well as a three-dimensional model. Unfortunately the proposal didn't win approval from the government, which is a shame as native plants and wildlife would have been a feature of this eco-friendly plan.

After some gourmet refreshments we went for a short walk around the area. We walked over to the island where some decaying pukumani poles are present, then had a walk along the weed infested cliffs on the Myilly Point side. *Myristica insipida*, *Adenanthera pavonina*, *Morinda citrifolia* and *Hibiscus tiliaceus* were some of the species observed.

### 2007 Open Garden Scheme Report

#### **Purple Patch (July)**

Kristin Metcalfe had an Open Garden on the weekend of the 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> of July at Coconut Grove. Kristin's garden contains an interesting mix of coastal and jungle plants. *Calophyllum sil* and *Calophyllum soulattri* grow near the front gate amongst 10 year old cycads. A highlight for me was the many aquatic ecosystems found in containers spread around the garden, featuring water lilies *Nelumbo nucifera* (Lotus Lily).

In the shady back garden, the *Angiopteris evecta* (King Fern) was a standout. The fronds of this fern can reach 4 metres in length. A sandstone rock garden in another section included *Pandanus basedowii* and *Hoya australis*, species which are found only in sandstone habitats.

Kristin invited the Top End Native Plant Society to have a display at her Open Garden, which was gratefully accepted. The weekend was a very successful promotion of native plants. Kristin also sold a few native plants, and tours of the adjacent mangroves were conducted by Dr Richard Willan.

#### Gondwana (August)

Dr Dale Dixon hosted another Open Garden on the weekend of the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> of August at Bakewell. Dale has a great garden, featuring top end native plants combined with other plants originating from Africa and South America. The weekend was a very successful promotion of native plants, as well as being a fundraiser for TENPS, as Dale had earlier invited us to provide information and to sell plants.

The small fig *Ficus liliputiana* was one of the many features of Dale's garden. It is a species that he discovered in the Kununurra / Keep River area and he named it!!

Other plants of particular interest to me included the white flowering ground cover *Heloitropium ovalifolium*, the red flowering *Abelmoshus moschatus* subsp. *tuberososis*, the purple flowering pea *Crotalaria verrucosa*, the yellow flowering peas *C. novaehollandia* and *C. crassipes*, many *Grevillea* and other proteaceous species and the yellow flowering *Cochlospermum gillivraei*. There were many more of course.....



Thank you to everyone who helped the club in any way with the weekend. Many members gave of their time in setting up or dismantling the display, and others promoted native plants by assisting with plant sales. Other members had grown a variety of healthy looking specimens to sell.

Besides being financially beneficial for the club through plant sales, the weekend was particularly pleasing in that we acquired several new members, and some past members rejoined. Welcome to our new members!

#### 2007 Tropical Garden Spectacular



The 2007 Tropical Garden Spectacular was held at the George Brown Darwin Botanic Gardens on the weekend of the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> of August. We set up our shelter tent late on Friday afternoon in our allocated spot under trees, unloaded some tables and display material and set out some plants in our space.
